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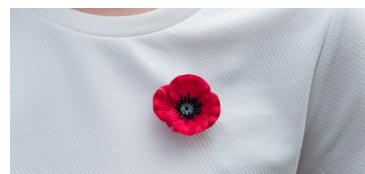
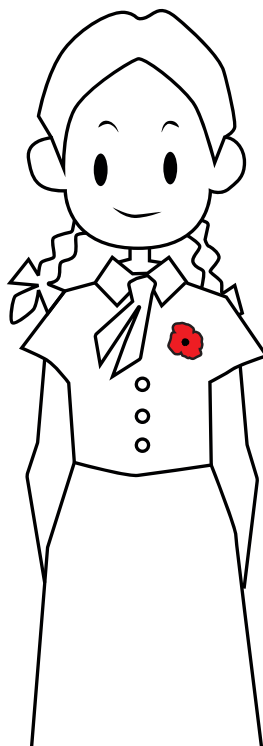
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Flowers are traditionally put on graves and memorials in memory of the dead.

These were popular during World War I. They are held to honour lost friends and express Mateship.

Is a symbol of Remembrance for World War I. They grew on the battlefields of the Western Front and are mentioned in the commemorative poem 'In Flanders Fields'

This is a symbol of Remembrance and grows in the wild on the Gallipoli Peninsula.

These are awarded to Defence Force Personnel and are worn on the left side if they were awarded to the person wearing them. They can also be worn on the right side if they were awarded to a family member.

This is done as a sign of respect and gives us time to remember those that gave their lives
