After the Gallipoli landings, ANZAC soldiers became known and respected around their world for their courage, endurance and mateship. Approximately 400,000 soldiers enlisted in World War I and 60,000 never returned home.

While some families changed forever as their loved ones did not return, war also changed society at home. Throughout the war and as soldiers returned home, the roles of women changed.

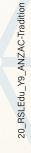
